World Health Organization : Neglected Tropical Diseases Course Series

Neglected tropical diseases (NTDs) are mainly prevalent in tropical areas, where they affect impoverished, underserved communities. They cause devastating health, social and economic consequences. WHO estimates that more than 1.6 billion people require treatment for at least one NTD every year.

The OpenWHO NTD channel offers learning resources to support implementation of prevention, control, elimination or eradication activities against 21 conditions or groups of conditions, in line with the Sustainable Development Goals and the overarching, cross-cutting and disease-specific targets included in the NTD road map 2021-2030. In pursuit of the goal of achieving health for all, the channel also includes courses on non-NTDs, notably skin-NTDs, given their importance for differential diagnosis and related case management.

Diaspora Engagement in Humanitarian Assistance: Webinar series by The International Organization for Migration (IOM) United Kingdom

From the floods in Bangladesh and Pakistan to the devastating drought in the Horn of Africa, to the ongoing conflict in Ukraine, diasporas have been among the first responders, providing immediate relief to populations in need, and mobilizing their skills, networks and resources at various crisis stages.

Diasporas represent key actors in transnational humanitarian assistance as they may act as bridges between local, national, regional, and international actors. In addition, diasporas' attachment to their homeland motivates them to create alliances with key stakeholders and navigate complex humanitarian systems to protect their communities from abroad.

Between October 2021 and February 2022, IOM, <u>Shabaka</u> and <u>ADEPT</u> jointly organized a series of three webinars to explore different perspectives on diaspora engagement in humanitarian assistance.

At home: Unaccompanied minors in France, an adolescence in exile

This is the story of Aïcha, Kady, Madihawa and Moussa: four young teenagers from Mali and Côte d'Ivoire who arrived in France after crossing the Mediterranean Sea; four young teenagers who are trying to have their child status recognized by French institutions; four unaccompanied minors who should be protected and cared for by France's child protection services but who can only rely on the solidarity of citizens and charities like Médecins Sans Frontières and Utopia 56.

Their day-to-day lives in France and the stories, told in the mini-series "At Home", reveal the institutional violence of the French state against children whose rights are trampled underfoot. In four

episodes, this series attempts to relate an adolescence in exile, interspersed with childhood dreams, solitude, determination, violence and hope.
